- We are audited annually by the Georgia Department of Audits & Accounts
 - 6 to 8 week process
 - Categorized as "low risk" by the Dept of Audits for the 4th year in a row

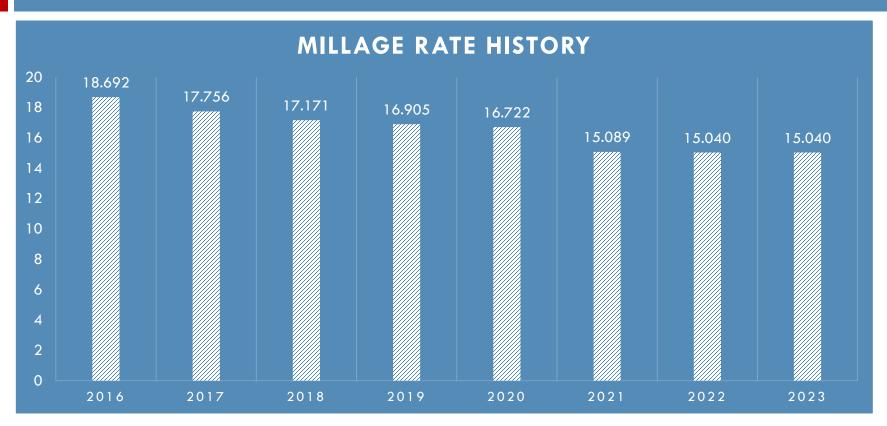


How is CCPS Funded?

- □ Local Property taxes
- □ State Quality Basic Education (QBE) formula
- □ Grants Title I, IDEA, etc.



- What does CCPS have control over?
 - School millage rate
- What does CCPS not have control over?
 - State funding mechanisms
 - Property tax process
 - State sanctioned regulations and expenses
 - Assessed value of taxpayer property



- The current millage rate of 15.040 is the lowest it has been since 2001.
- □ Took the rollback every year from 2016 2022.
- CCBOE kept rate the same in 23-24 at 15.040.



Local

- What is the millage rate?
 - The millage rate is the amount of tax dollars CCPS can levy for every \$1,000 of property's assessed value (1 mill = \$1 tax per \$1,000 of assessed value)
 - CCPS/Catoosa County/Ringgold/Fort O all set a millage rate yearly
 - For example
 - Market Value = \$282,000
 - Assessed Value = \$112,800 (40% of market value)
 - Current Millage Rate = 15.040
 - Property Tax = \$1,696.51

- Taking the rollback from 2018-2022 kept local relatively funds flat
- By keeping the millage rate the same in 2023 there was a large increase in funding due to property values increasing

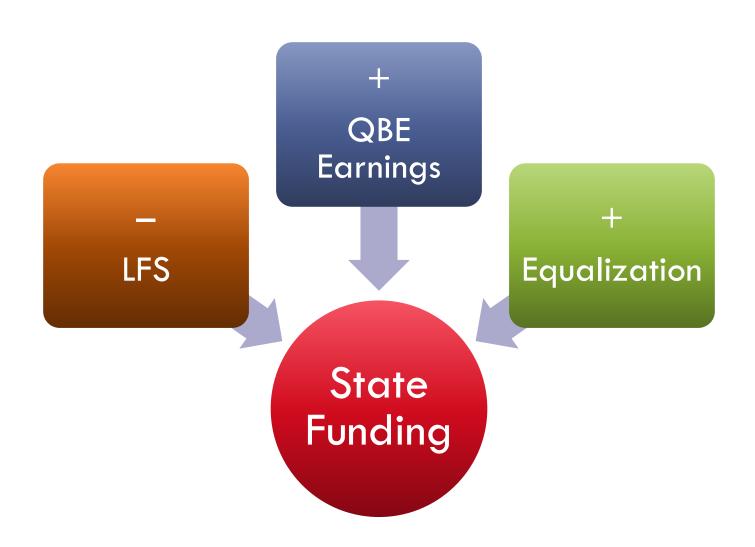


State Funding

QBE formula

- Key concepts
 - Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) refers to data collected for Quality Basic Education funding and is based on student enrollment and the education services provided by local school systems to students
 - The Local Fair Share (LFS) is a reduction in funding from the State equal to five mills of the local tax digest
 - Equalization funding is intended to equalize Georgia school systems by ranking systems according to wealth and providing additional funding to those less-wealthy systems

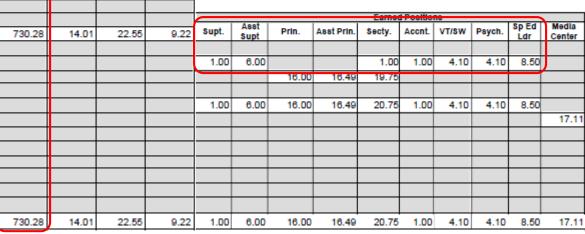

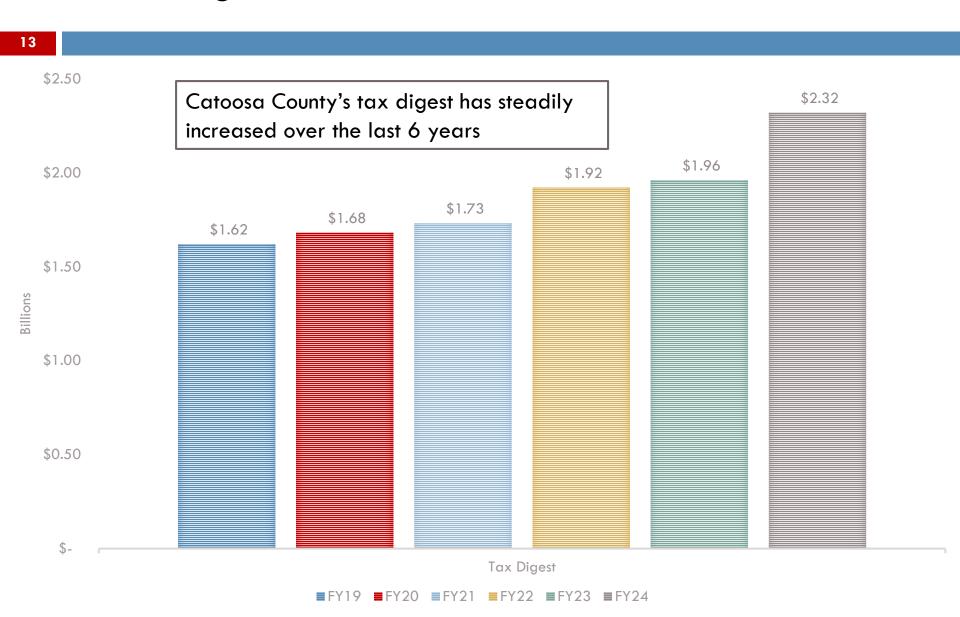

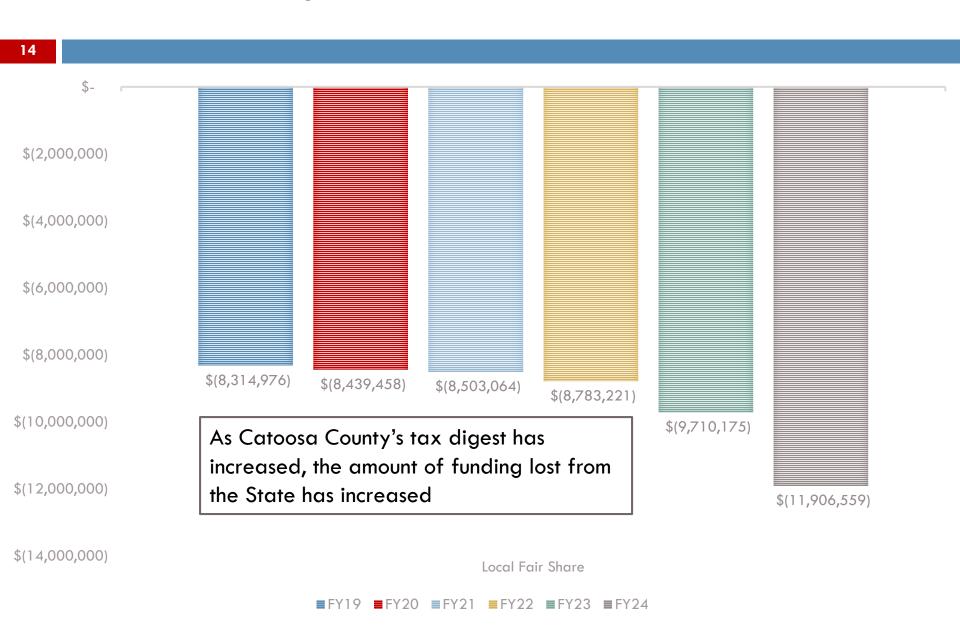


Tax Digest Trend



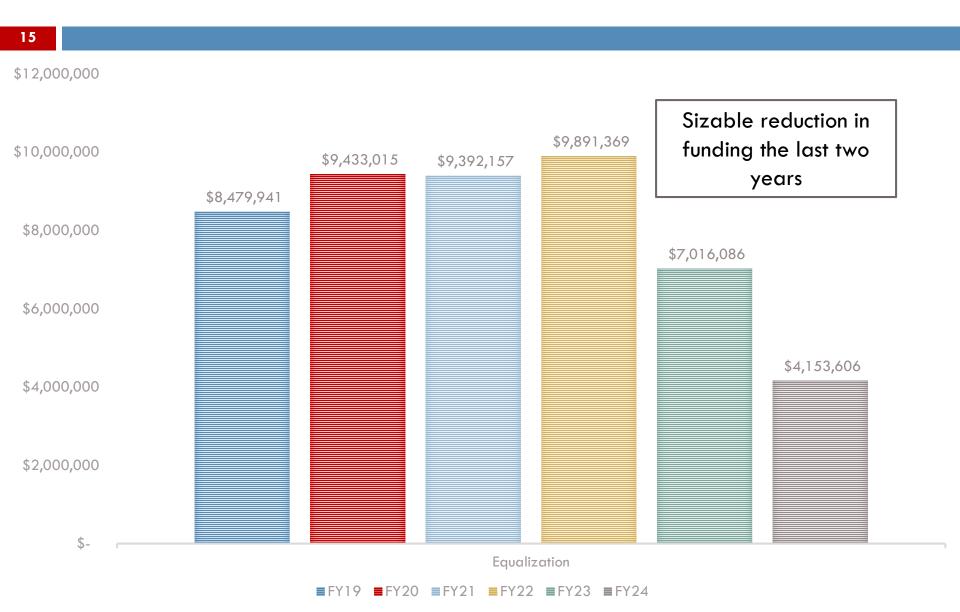


Local Fair Share Trend





Equalization Funding Trend



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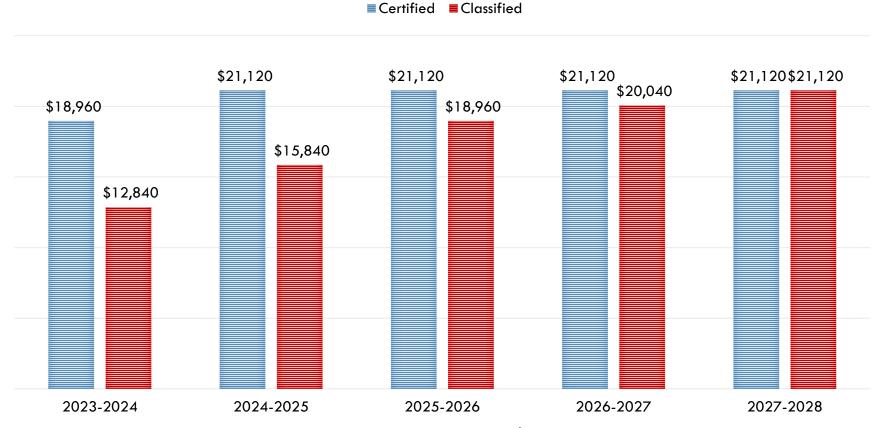
Local and State impacts on funding

- When property values go up, Equalization funding goes down because CCPS has the ability to increase local funding
- When property values go up, our Local Fair Share also increases reducing our State funding

EMPLOYER COST FOR STATE HEALTH PLANS ANNUAL COST PER EMPLOYEE

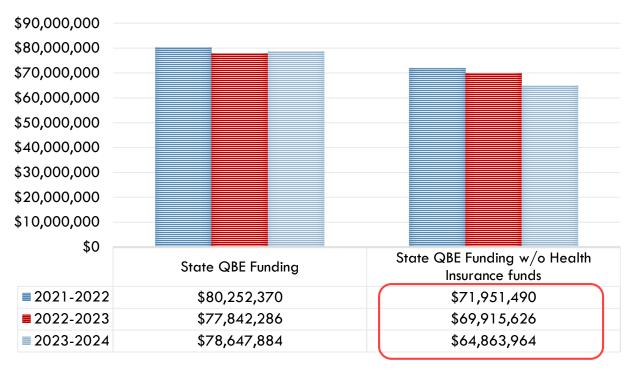


The annual cost for all employees was only \$11,700 two years ago.

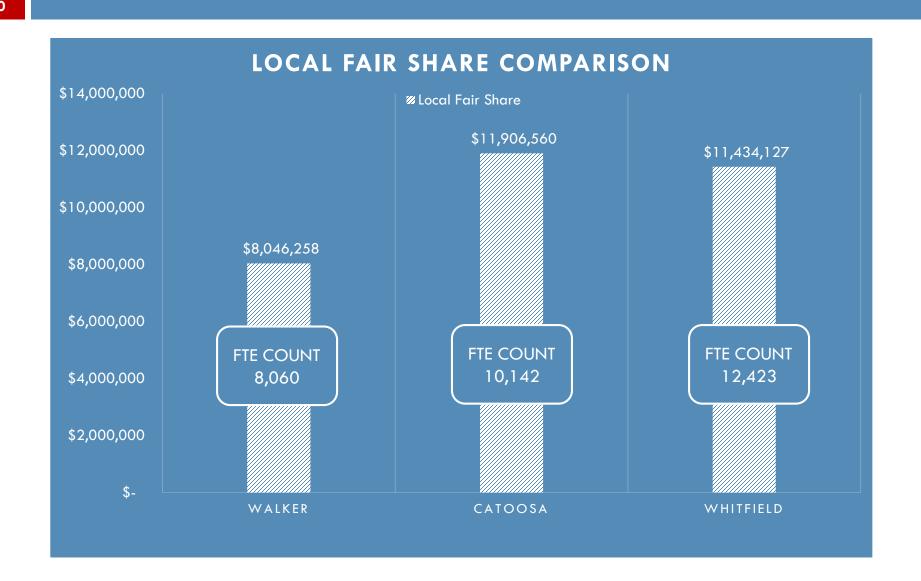
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Cost Challenges

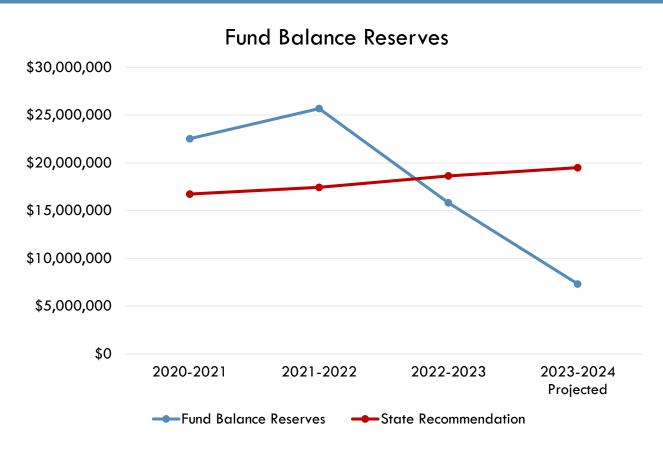
- Catoosa County's property is undervalued (according to the State)
 - Why is this a problem?
 - The State of Georgia's Sales Ratio Study
 - Compares local government measurements to the State's valuation
 - CCPS's Local Fair Share (LFS) is calculated based on the State's value
 - Local funds are collected at locally measured value
 - For 2024-2025, we are projected to lose \$15.8 million in State funding to the LFS calculation while only collecting \$11.65 million locally to replace it
 - According to the State's report Catoosa is the 2nd most undervalued county in the entire state

Cost Challenges



In recent years, CCBOE has made the conscious decision to eat into it's reserves in order to address these challenges, keep operating normally, and not increase the tax burden on Catoosa County citizens whenever possible.

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2023-2024

- Proactive actions are being taken to address these challenges now
 - \$4+ million in District and School level savings by combining responsibilities and budget cutting
 - Limiting out of state travel District-wide, whenever possible
 - Aggressively pursuing alternative vendors to identify cost savings
 - Reviewing all policies and procedures to identify efficiencies



2024-2025 & Beyond

- □ CCPS's budget is 90% employee costs
 - Staff, not stuff
 - Can't turn enough lights off
 - Reducing headcount across the District Office and Schools via attrition and combining responsibilities
 - Aiming for \$5.5 million in savings
 - Looking closely at enrollment counts and State recommended class sizes
 - What do does our community feel is worth fighting for?
